

**A**fter that I hidy accomplishid and synysched dyuers  
yreal andy worldly actes of grete conquerours & pryn-  
ces / And also certayn bookes of ensamples andy doctrine /  
Many noble andy dyuers gentlemen of thys woynde of Eng-  
lande cameyn andy remaunded me many andy oyfynes / Wherefore  
that I haue not do made & enpriynt the noble hystorye of the  
saint gral / andy of the moost renommed crysten kyng / Kyng  
andy chyef of the wte best crysten andy worthy kyng Arthur /  
Whiche ought moost to be remembred emonge the englyssh  
men for al other crysten men / For it is noteworthy knollen  
through the uniuersal world / that ther been is worthy & the  
best that euer were / That is to wete the pwynys / the Jelbes  
andy the crysten men / As for the pwynys they were before the  
Inuincyon of Crist / Whiche were named / the syre Hector  
of Troye / of whome hystorye is comen bothe in fable and in  
prose / The secound Alyaunde the grete / & the thyrde Julius  
Cesar Empewour of Rome of whome hystoryes ben wel kno-  
andy had / Andy as for the the Jelbes whiche also were before  
hystorye of our lord of whome the syre was Due Ior-  
suc Whiche brought the chyldren of Israfel in to the lande of  
hystere / The second Dauidz kyng of Iherusalem / & the thyrde  
Judas Machabeus of whese the sybble rekereth al theyr no-  
ble hystoryes & actes / Andy sythe the sayd Inuincyon haue  
ben the noble crysten men scalded andy admited through the  
uniuersal world / to the nombre of the ix kyng & worthy of  
whome was first the noble Arthur / whose noble actes I pur-  
pose to bryte in this present booke her folowyng / The secound  
was Charlemaign or Charles the grete / of whome hystorye is  
had in many places bothe in fable andy englyssh / andy the  
thyrde andy last was Godfray of Iherusalem / of whos actes & lyf  
I made a booke And the excellent pryncipe andy kyng of noble me-  
morie kyng Edibardz the fourth / the sayd noble knyghtmen  
instantly required me to mynste hystorye of the sayd noble  
kyng andy conquerour kyng Arthur / andy of his knyghtes  
wyth hystorye of the saint gral / and of the ded andy endyng  
of the sayd Arthur / Affirmynge that I ouzt rather tenyng  
his actes andy noble feates / than of godfray of Iherusalem / et

ony of the other eyghte / considerynge that he was a man boore  
byþm his rogame and þyng and Emperor of the same /  
And hat hem ben in frenſſe dyuers and many noble folu-  
mes of his actes / and also of his knyghtes / To whom I  
answeryd / that dyuers men holde oppynyon / that ther was  
no such Arthur / and that also such bookes as þey made of  
hem þen but fayged and fables / þycause that somme cronys  
make of hym no mencyon ne remembre hym noo thynge  
ne of his knyghtes / whereto they answeþd / and one in ſpecial  
sayd / that in hym that shold say or thynke / that ther was ne  
uer such a kyng callyd Arthur / myght wel be aerted grete  
folke and bludene ſe / For he sayd that ther were many euy-  
dens of the contrarye / Hysse ye may ſee hiſ ſepulture in the  
monaſterie of Glouſtugburgre / Andz also in rokewyngow in  
the þe book the ſyght chappelle / andz in the ſeuenth book the  
xxvij chapter / wher hiſ body was buryed and after foun-  
den and translated in to the ſayd monaſterie / þe þat is alſo  
in the ſcorne of boches in hiſ book de caſu principum / part of  
hiſ noble actes / andz also of hiſ falle / Also galfridus in  
hiſ bauitſſe book recounteth hiſ lyf / andz in dyuers places  
of Englaund / many remembrauntes þen yet of hym andz shall  
remayne perpetually / andz also of hiſ knyghtes / First in the  
abbey of Westmister at ſaint Edwardes ſtryne remayneth the  
pwynt of hiſ ſeal in red waxe checquyred in kerly / In whiche is  
þyngon Patriacus Arthurius / Gallicanis / Gallie / Germanie /  
dace / Imperator / Item in the caſtel of dover to may ſee Gau-  
wyns ſkulle / et cadiſis mantel / At bwincheſter the wunde-  
table / in other places Launcelottes ſwerde and many other  
kynges / Whene al theſe thynges conſidered there can no man  
reſonably gaynſay but ther was a kyng of thiſ lande named  
Arthur / For in al places cristen and hithe he is re-  
puted and taken for one of the iþ worthy / And the fyſt of  
the thiſ Cristen men / And also he is more ſpoiled of leþonte  
theſe moo bookes made of hiſ noble actes than therre be in  
Englaund as wel in duche yorþen þayniffre and graliffre as  
in frenſſe / And yet of record remayne in bwincheſteſſe of hym in  
Wales in the toun of Caerleſt the grete ſtones e meruayl-  
ful werkys of won ſyng under the grounde e ryal fautes

whiche dyuers nobl þynging hath ſeon / wherfor it is a meruayl  
þyng he is nomore renomed in hiſ obyne contrye / ſauſ onely  
it accordeth to the wordy of god / whiche ſayth that no man is  
accept for a propheete in hiſ obyne contrye / Whene al theſe thynges  
ges forſayd alledged I could not wel conþ / but that ther was

mes to make of hym e of hiſ noble knyghte in frenſſe whiche  
I haue ſeen e rede beyonde the ſee / which been not hid in our  
maternal tongue / but in walſſe ben many e also in frenſſe /  
e ſomme in englyſſe but nowher neygh alle wherfor ſuiche as  
haue late ben dwaben oure breſefg in to englyſſe / I haue after  
the ſympyle conmyng whaf godz hath ſent to me / Under the  
fauour and correctyon of al noble lordes and gentylmen em-  
peried to empynge a book of the noble hystories of the ſayd  
kyng Arthur / andz of certayn of hiſ knyghtes after a coppe  
Unto me delverord / whiche coppe Syr Thomas Malory dyde  
take out of certayn bookeſ of frenſſe and reduced it in to  
Englyſſe / Andz I accordyng to my coppe haue doon ſet it  
in empynge / to the entente that noble men may ſee and ſetene  
the noble actes of chualterye / the tentyl and vertuous dedes  
that ſomme knyghtes vſed in the daies / by whiche they came  
to honour / andz hold they that therre ſpoures were purpſied  
andz ſet to ſhame and rebuke / humbly býchaynȝ al no-  
ble lordes andz ladys whiche al other ſtaffs of what estate  
or degree they been of / that þal ſee andz rede in this ſayd book  
and bwincheſteſſe / that they take the goodz andz honest actes in their  
remembrance / andz to folowe the ſame / Wherin they ſhalle  
fynde many joyous and playfauſt hystories / andz noble e  
renomed actes of humaunte / genylnesse and chualterye /  
For herein may ſee noble chualterye / Curyeſye / Humauyte  
frenſſe / hardynesse / loue / frenſſe / Colbardiſſe / Murſ  
dri / hitte / vertue / and ſonne / Doo after the goodz andz leue  
the evyl / andz it ſhal bringe you to good ſame andz renome  
mee / Andz ſo to paſſe the tyme thiſ book ſhal be pleauant  
to rede in / but ſo to gye ſayd andz býleue that al is truelde  
that is conþegnezd herein / ye ſe at your býker / but al is býke-  
ton for our doctrine / andz ſo to beware that we ſalle not to
